## GOD AND CAESAR

*From 'Sunday Reflection' by Eugene Lobo, SJ*



The Pharisees looked for an answer from Jesus on the issue of tax. They thought that if Jesus responds saying that the tax is lawful and should be paid would certainly upset the Jews. But if he responded saying it is not lawful and should not be paid, then he will be advocating breaking the law and would upset the Romans. Whatever be his answer, they were certain of their victory. Jesus, of course, was perfectly aware of the dangers in giving a straight answer. He accused them of gross hypocrisy in setting this trap.

They had no desire to know the answer because they had their own answers already. Their only intention was to lay a trap for Jesus and to catch with some verbal error.

Cleverly and deliberately Jesus begins to turn the tables. Jesus asks them to show him a coin. An observant Jew was not supposed to carry with him a Roman coin with Caesar's inscription on it. But here the Pharisees did not have any problem in producing one at the request of Jesus.

Jesus clearly makes them understand that the Roman coinage technically belonged to the emperor or the Government. He then gave them his famous answer, "Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God."

The answer left them to ponder as it does even today. The individual has to discern and see what is that which belongs to God and what is under the control of the state. The state has many obligations: public services, water supply, schooling, social welfare for the poor and the aged and the civil protection. Religion's duties are to connect people with God, the ultimate answer to our questions and the basis of our life's decisions.

We all are, in some way, the citizens of two kingdoms: citizens of the political territory where we belong and citizens in God's Kingdom. As Jesus says, they both require certain loyalties from us. In the context of the Gospel we need to realize that when we really love our country and its people, then we may have to stand in strong opposition to the authorities on certain issues. Of course, the authorities will try to present such people as traitors and a threat to the stability of the country. Today's Gospel makes it very clear that we have two responsibilities: to the government of our country and to God our creator. Where both are in harmony there cannot be any conflict. Wherever there is immoral or unjust behaviour against people's dignity and rights, then there has to be conflict. Such conflict is not always bad. It is because of creative conflict that our society makes progress. Provided we always act in a positive and creative way, "speaking the truth in love", then the earthly kingdoms that people build can, in time, become the Kingdom of God. As a famous dissident — and martyr, St Thomas More, said: "The King's good servant, but God's first."

**Synod on the Family**

American spouses Alice and Jeff Heinzen from the Diocese of LaCrosse, Wisconsin, say they are “definitely being heard” at this Synod of Bishops. The couple, who work in marriage ministry for their diocese, are participating as auditors at the Synod.

We are pleased to see the sincerity of the Synod assembly to address the pastoral challenges of the family. For example, we did not expect the Holy Father to be with us every day of the first week. His presence in the assembly emphasizes the importance that the Vatican has placed on this topic. He is with us and, by extension, he is with the families under his care.

It is important to remember that all of the Synod assembly is on the same page - all of us are striving to ensure that marriage and family life follows God's plan. The Holy Father believes families need more support in today's culture. That is why he has asked for the extensive study of the issues. It is important to remember that this Synod is just one step in the full investigation and response. The process began one year ago when all dioceses were asked to submit a report on the state of marriage and family. This step (i.e. the Extraordinary Synod) is looking at a synopsis of these reports and opening the discussion on what can be done to make the plight of the family better. In October 2015, another group of Synod Fathers will come together to provide us with a report. We have confidence in the process that has been chosen. And we are grateful for the depth of faith and openness of the Synod Fathers to the animation of the Holy Spirit.

The Synod Fathers are actively listening to the auditors. Our lived experiences as married couples are of great interest to them. They are asking us questions and engaging us in dialogue. We are definitely being heard.

**Concluding Ten Steps towards being a Good Sport:**

**Step 8: Support sports people who show positive values.** Many sports people have become community leaders supporting health and inclusiveness, campaigning against violence and discrimination, and working for equality and poverty relief. Support players at local, state and national levels who show positive values: send them a text or email, go and watch them, ask them to come and talk at your club or school.

**Step 9: Challenge over-commercialisation, drugs and gambling.** Often sport can become a commercial enterprise in itself and lose sight of the good it should be doing for society. Make your views known to individuals and clubs that exhibit this downside: unfair play, excessive gambling, drugs, or a win-at-all-costs attitude.

**Step 10: Understand that not everyone loves sport.** Not everyone may share your enthusiasm for your particular sport or team - or any sport at all. Some people have strong personal reasons for being alienated from sport. Respect their choices and be sensitive in expressing your own enthusiasm.
